Director Vicki Wolfe returns to SCT to direct To Gillian on her 37th Birthday



Curtain Call staff met with Vicki to learn more about this touching drama. An interview with Vicki provides the most incredible insight into a theatrical production and leaves one with the desire to be sure to not miss the show.

Why Gillian ...?

Any play that has a dead character on stage would appeal to me. Seriously, I read this play many years ago, and decided that I wanted to direct it someday. I knew that the title character died in an accident, leaving a husband and 14 year old daughter. But it was only after re-reading it for this production that I realized she had died on her 35th birthday. My mother died in an accident on her 30th birthday when I was five. This synchronicity made me feel I was destined to direct this play (but I feel that way about most plays I direct). Beyond that, the grief experience is always a rich theme, and this play handles it with a great deal of authenticity, beautifully portrayed by a near perfect cast. There is much humor. which can surround these events if we allow it. The theme, along with the beach/ocean/lighthouse setting, provides great opportunities for special lighting/sound effects. The venue offers challenges for creativity, and it's going to be fun to see how much we can do.

Since beginning with SCT?

After directing some of SCT's first shows in the early 80's, and acting with them in *The Devil's Disciple* and *Murder at the Howard Johnson's*, I took time off to earn a living. In '88, I helped get Stillwater Players started and di-

rected several shows for them. In '95, I returned to SCT to direct my favorite show, *Morning's at Seven*. I then went on to direct 3 seasons at Round Lake Auditorium, and SCT's *Oliver* in 2000. After that, I directed an original play, *The Nursery*, at Caffe Lena. Since then, I've written, produced and directed several shows at Unity, a metaphysical church I belong to in Albany. I've always been attracted to spiritual themes, as I believe theatre is the ultimate metaphysical experience.

You seem to love theatre — why so long between shows?

I love a lot of things. In my other life, I paint, remodel, refinish furniture, and am currently rehabbing two buildings my partner and I bought in Troy, in addition to the ongoing rehab of my Saratoga property. I also invested in some video equipment, hoping to get myself interested in that media form, but it hasn't happened yet. In short, the commitment I make to a production usually trumps everything else I'm doing. So, if I'm heavily involved in something that doesn't give me much spare time, I find it hard to fit in a show. I become consumed with it, at the expense of other commitments. This obsession is less than it used to be, as I've given up the pursuit of doing theatre professionally (as in making a living at it). I stress to my cast and crew, though, that professionalism is a state of attitude, and in that regard, I still want a professional show. This cast and crew is obliging.

Does the smaller venue (Black Box Theatre) pose a problem?

No more than a larger one. Just different. I'm so impressed that SCT is still around after so many years, that I'm determined to make it work. The enthusiasm I've received from my cast and crew has been wonderful, and I'm grateful to Anna,

Lorraine, Michele and Donna for stepping into the fray with me. I've worked with these exceptionally competent people in the past, so it's like a homecoming. We had our first meeting over brunch at Lorraine's, and it was one of the best times I've ever had. I came away on such a high that I wondered why I don't direct more often.

The best show I've ever worked on is always the current one I'm doing, and when I looked at the Black Box, I tried to envision the possibilities with no negativity. It worked, and I'm finding the staging much easier, and therefore, less stressful than if I were on the main stage. The primary set challenge is the inability to set it up prior to the show. We do it on opening day, so it has to be extremely portable. Sound effects aren't a problem (and there will be lots of them), but providing the kind of lighting effect I want will be challenging. I anticipate being very hands on during the production, as I don't know how I would impart exactly what to do to anyone else in such a short time. I imagine I'll be making it up as I go on the first night, and then making corrections on the second night. Hey, maybe the opening night audience should come back the second night to see what's changed! One advantage I do have is in the person of Elizabeth Woodbury Kasius, a composer/pianist friend of mine who will be providing background music for the production. She's great at improvisation, so will be able to go with the flow of the production, instead of having to be tightly rehearsed. I wrote a song about my own mother about 25 years ago; I've rewritten the lyrics to fit this play, and Elizabeth will arrange and play the music as Gillian and her daughter, Rachel, sing it at the end of the first act.

Will the audience be depressed at the end of this show?

Not at all! A little reflective, perhaps, but death is as much a part of life as anything else, and we in the western world don't address it nearly enough. We try to avoid it, ignore it - anything to get through it. The necessity of the grieving process isn't always acknowledged. You may come away from Gillian feeling that the characters handled it correctly . . . Or not. There's no perfect way. This character driven play treats the subject with reverence and humor, and each time I read it, I find another aspect that either makes me laugh . . . Or makes me cry. That's the sign of a good script.

Sounds like you've got this show figured out. Never.

On To Gillian on her 37th Birthday

Gillian is dead. Very, very, very dead. But her continued presence (or memory, you decide) in the experience of her husband, David (Christopher Welch), and therefore, the experience of her daughter, Rachel (Elizabeth Ruland), is causing concern for those around them. David's conversations with Gillian (Donna Hillebrandt) on the beach are the only way he can cope with her absence. Yet, the "real" world, as well as Gillian herself, is urging him back. His oldest friend, Paul (Frank Pickus), does it with humor: Gillian's sister. Esther (Kimberly Dauphinais), does it with authority; Rachel's best friend, Cindy (Emily Bryan), does it with a teenage crush; Rachel does it with innocence; and Kevin (Barbara Miner) is caught in the middle.

The time is the present; the place is a beach on Nantucket Island with a lighthouse in the distance. Sea gulls are swooping, stars are exploding into existence, fog horns are blowing; and the waves are singing . . . "life goes on."

And tomorrow is an anniversary.
